

Criteria

Eligibility Criteria – Park name nominations should:

- 1. Be culturally, historically or environmentally important
- 2. Be in any language
- 3. Not be named after an individual person, company, or organization

Selection Criteria – Must meet at least one.

- 1. Name is reflective of a culturally significant element to the specific location or history of the park
- 2. Name is reflective of an environmentally significant element to the specific location or history of the park
- 3. Name accounts for the representation and inclusion of communities of color




